INTERFAITH RAINFOREST INITIATIVE PLENARY SESSION AT 2023 PARLIAMENT OF THE WORLD'S RELIGIONS

A CALL FROM INDIGENOUS LEADERS FOR PROTECTION OF THE AMAZON AND ITS PEOPLE



On August 16th, the Interfaith Rainforest Initiative (IRI) facilitated a high-level dialogue with indigenous leaders from across the Amazon Basin at the 2023 Parliament of the World's Religions in Chicago, USA.

The event, "An Urgent Call to Protect the Amazon: An Interfaith Rainforest Initiative Dialogue with Indigenous Peoples", was delivered as a plenary session for the more than 7,000 religious leaders gathered at the Parliament.

The plenary, which aimed to raise the voices of indigenous peoples in their fight for protection of the Amazon and profile IRI as a shared platform for religious leaders to work shoulder to shoulder with indigenous peoples to protect forests and the rights of forest guardians, concluded with An Urgent Call to Action to Protect the Amazon.

THE IMPORTANCE OF PROTECTING RAINFORESTS AND THE RIGHTS OF INDIGENOUS PEOPLES
